

Request: The applicant requests a conditional use permit to establish a "Hotel (without full service restaurant)" at 2710 NASA Parkway.

Background/Issue (What prompted this need?):

The applicant wishes to establish a Hotel (without a full service restaurant) at the property located at 2710 NASA Parkway.

The applicant has indicated that the project will be an 80 room Holiday Inn Express, including food service and a dining room; however, the dining room will not meet the definition as a full service restaurant, as this is not permissible by the Holiday Inn franchise.

The building is based on the Holiday Inn Express prototype and is proposed to have a maximum ceiling height on the ground floor of 12'-0", and guest room ceiling heights of 9'-0". The building will be four stories and have a parapet roof, with a slightly higher parapet above the main entrance to accommodate the wall signage. This will result in an overall height of approximately 48' above the ground floor or approximately 50'-0" above finished grade.

The property is located within a C-2 (Commercial – Medium) Zoning District.



WHEREAS, Harshy Seabrook Hospitality Inc., “Applicant”, in accordance with the requirements of Section 4.11 of the City’s Comprehensive Ordinance, Appendix A of the Code of the City of Seabrook (“Zoning Ordinance”), has requested the issuance of a Conditional Use Permit (“CUP”) to allow the construction and operation of a Hotel, without a full service restaurant, to be located at 2710 NASA Parkway, within a C-2 (Medium Commercial) district; and

WHEREAS, the Zoning Ordinance, Section 3.15 requires the issuance of a Conditional Use Permit to allow a Hotel without a full service restaurant in a C-2 zoning district; and

WHEREAS, the Planning and Zoning Commission of the City of Seabrook has conducted a public hearing, received input from staff and has issued its final report recommending approval of the subject CUP; and

WHEREAS, all required hearings on this matter have been held, all criteria have been established for the consideration by City Council, and the applicant has agreed to comply with all ordinances of the City of Seabrook;

48 **NOW THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE**

51 **SECTION 1. FINDINGS OF FACT.**

52
53 The facts and matters set forth in the preamble of this Ordinance are hereby found to be
54 true and correct and incorporated by reference, including the representations of Applicant, (as
55 referenced in its application for CUP, the final report from the Planning & Zoning Commission
56 of November 19, 2015 recommending this CUP and the minutes of City Council of January 5
57 and January 19, 2016), the performance of which City Council is specifically relying upon in
58 granting this CUP, as provided hereafter.

59
60 **SECTION 2. USE PERMITTED.**

61
62 A Conditional Use Permit is hereby granted to allow a Hotel without a full service
63 restaurant, in the C-2 (Medium Commercial) district located at 2710 NASA Parkway. Such
64 Conditional Use Permit shall be in conformance with all conditions contained herein, and city
65 ordinances, including the Comprehensive Zoning Ordinance and Subdivision Ordinance. In
66 order to assure the proposed use meets all criteria contained in Section 4.11 of the Zoning
67 Ordinance and related provisions of the Code of Ordinances, this Conditional Use Permit shall
68 be in strict conformance with the following conditions which have been agreed by Applicant:

70 addition, failure of Applicant to comply with all ordinances of the City of Seabrook shall result
71 in the immediate termination of this permit. This permit shall not be transferred to any other
72 address.

74 **SECTION 3. AMENDMENT TO THE CODE.**

76 The Code of the City of Seabrook, Appendix A, "Comprehensive Zoning", Article 12,
77 Section 12.03 "Conditional use permits granted" is hereby amended by adding a new paragraph
78 Twenty-One (21) which shall read as follows:

80 **"(21) By Ordinance No. 2016-01, a conditional use permit was granted to allow the**
81 **construction and operation of a Hotel without a full service restaurant at 2710 NASA**
82 **Parkway which is located in a C-2 zoning district. Failure to comply with any conditions**
83 **imposed and all ordinances of the City of Seabrook shall result in the immediate**
84 **termination of this permit. This permit shall not be transferred to any other address."**

86 **SECTION 4. INCORPORATION INTO THE CODE; PENALTY CLAUSE.**

87
88 This Ordinance is hereby incorporated into and made a part of the Seabrook City Code
89 and violation of any provision hereof shall be subject to the penalty described in said Code,
90 Section 1-15 "General Penalty; continuing violations" which provides that any person who
91 shall violate any provision of this Ordinance shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor and,
92 upon conviction, shall be fined in an amount not to exceed \$2,000. Each day of violation shall
93 constitute a separate offense.

95 **SECTION 5. REPEAL OF CONFLICTING ORDINANCES.**

All ordinances or parts of ordinances inconsistent or in conflict herewith are, to the extent of such inconsistency or conflict, hereby repealed.

100 **SECTION 6. SEVERABILITY.**

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In the event any clause, phrase, provision, sentence, or any part of this Ordinance or the application of the same to any person or circumstances shall for any reason be adjudged invalid or held unconstitutional by a court of competent jurisdiction, it shall not affect, impair, or invalidate this Ordinance as a whole or any part or provision hereof other than the part declared to be invalid or unconstitutional; and the City Council of the City of Seabrook, Texas, declares that it would have passed each and every part of the same notwithstanding the omission of any such part thus declared to be invalid or unconstitutional, whether there be one or more parts.

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SECTION 7. NOTICE.

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The City Secretary shall give notice of the enactment of this Ordinance by promptly publishing it or its descriptive caption and penalty after final passage in the official newspaper of the City; the Ordinance to take effect upon publication.


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






Project Site




FOOTSTEPS FOR THE FALLEN - 5K RUN

80

81 Sean Landis, Deputy City Manager, stated this request is for reconstruction of a three 3
82 story, 70 room Hampton Inn hotel that was destroyed by a fire on April 30, 2015. A
83 Conditional Use Permit is required because more than 50% of the building was damaged
84 by the fire. The new hotel will be located west of Elam, next to the Edgelake
85 Apartments, on Nasa Rd. 1. The property is currently zoned in a C-2 district. The
86 Planning and Zoning Commission approved recommendation to Council for approval of
87 the Conditional Use Permit by a vote of four members, with three members absent.

88 The applicant stated that he owned the Hampton Inn before the fire. The plans for the
89 new building are drawn and the Hilton Corporation has approved them. Before the fire,
90 the Hampton Inn was the highest tax generating hotel in Seabrook, and the number 2
91 rated Hampton branded hotel in Texas. The day before the fire news was received that
92 the hotel was ranked in the top 10% in the world. In 2014, the Hampton Inn saw over
93 19,000 guests, who were encouraged to visit local restaurants and put money back into
94 the City. There were 21 employees who were active in the community. The slab was
95 saved from the fire, so the footprint will stay the same. There will be LED lighting on the
96 outside of the building. The first floor will be 14 feet high instead of the original 10 feet
97 in height. There will be an enlarged breakfast area; beer and wine will be served in the
98 suite shop; there will be RFID controlled locks; the rooms will have Smart TVs; and
99 there will be a swimming pool with outdoor seating and a theatre. The general shape will
100 look the same, but everything else will be different. An application has been submitted to
101 the Hilton Corporation, and is pending, for a liquor license to have a bar outside,
102 connected to the pool. The conference area will be the same size as before, of over 1,000
103 square feet, which will hold 100 theatre style seats and 60-70 banquet style seats. Right
104 now discussions with the insurance company are occurring for having 80-85 guest rooms,
105 if the building is built entirely of concrete. Before the fire, occupancy ran a little over
106 70% with 70 rooms. The majority of guests were corporate.

107
108 Michael Gzertner, Architect for Holiday Inn Express, 5008 Denver Drive, Galveston,
109 spoke in favor of approval of the Conditional Use Permit. He stated the Hampton Inn is a
110 great product with a great occupancy rate, a good daily rate, and it draws business from
111 surrounding communities. Holiday Inn Express is 100% in support of this project.

112
113 Barth Patel, owner of the property at 2710 Nasa Parkway, spoke in favor of the approval
114 of the Conditional Use Permit for the Hampton Inn. He stated the economy of the area is
115 increasing, and adding more hotels to this City is good. It will definitely be a great
116 project and a success.

198 Jeff Galyean, Director of Emergency Management, stated that the Public Safety Fund is
199 funded through a \$3 fee on residents' water bills. During the 2014/2015 Fiscal Year;
200 \$98,000 was collected, minus 10% for reserves, for a total available for expenditures on
201 equipment or services that enhance Public Safety of \$88,200.
202

203 The Fire Safety Task Force is made up of the Police Chief, the Fire Chief, the Clear Lake
204 Emergency Medical Corps Chief, a representative from the Public Works Department, a
205 representative from the Community Emergency Response Team, the City Manager, and
206 the Deputy City Manager.

120 handguns as of January 1, 2016. Council has the authority to allow licensed concealed
121 and/or open carry of only handguns at meetings governed by the Texas Open Meetings
122 Act. Council has several options, including prohibiting both open and concealed carry;
123 allowing both open and concealed carry; or prohibiting one type of carry while allowing
124 the other type of carry. All options relate to only handguns and only during public
125 meetings. Regulations for Municipal Court and for City facilities in general are governed
126 by State statutes.

127 Discussion among Council members ensued regarding open carry versus concealed carry
128 and whether individual members would want both or only one type of carry allowed
129 during public meetings. Gayle Cook, City Manager, explained that staff is in favor of
130 keeping everyone safe and would be in agreement with prohibiting open carry and
131 allowing concealed carry. Because it wasn't clear what the consensus was among

196 include all three customer service areas with closed glass and a middle tray, much like
197 many banks now have. The Building Department will have a sliding, hinged door, so
198 plans can pass through. There will be new protective shielding in the doors leading to the
199 Community Development Department and the City Secretary's Office. The counters

200 underneath the shielding will be ballistic as well, so that the total area is protected. The
201 bid package also includes ballistic material on the dias in the Council Chamber. Because
202 this expenditure was not originally in the budget, Council will need to approve a
203 supplemental appropriation.

32 the end of this fiscal year and into next year, until the positions are filled. Pam and
33 Rebecca will remain on staff until the end of March. The President and Sales and Service
34 Manager's positions were paid by Houston First, but BACVB will have to pay the
35 salaries when the positions are filled. Other cities have not talked to their Councils yet,
36 so it is unknown at this time if other cities will choose to dissolve the Bureau. The
37 BACVB has been in existence for 14 years.

38 **2.0 PUBLIC COMMENTS AND ANNOUNCEMENTS**

39

40 No speakers came forward to speak during the Public Comments and Announcements
41 portion of the agenda.

42 Mayor Royal announced that there will be a meeting on March 3 at 6:00pm at the new
43 San Jacinto College Maritime facility in Shore Acres to address storm surge protection.
44 The City would like residents to attend. The Gulf Coast Community Protection and
45 Recovery District has released the phase II findings of the Storm Surge Suppression
46 Study. Phase II findings suggest two mitigation options, which are: 1) a coastal spine and

48 TXDOT's plan. The Mayor stated that he is on record in strong opposition to the
49 elevation of Highway 146. Large public turnout will be beneficial.

140 anticipated franchise and mixed beverage revenues; and vacancies in Public Safety. The
141 earlier estimated General Fund final balance was around \$750,000, being conservative in
142 the estimated impact of the Compensation Study. The surplus funds will go into reserves.


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



49 The facts and matters set forth in the preamble of this Ordinance are hereby found
50 to be true and correct.

51

52 **SECTION 2. COMPLIANCE WITH TRANSPORTATION CODE.**

53

54 Upon the basis of an engineering and traffic investigation conducted by the Texas
55 Department of Transportation heretofore made for the following amendments, attached
56 hereto and as authorized by the provisions of Section 545.356, Texas Transportation
57 Code, the following amended prima facie speed limits hereafter indicated for vehicles are
58 hereby determined and declared to be reasonable and safe; and such speed limits are
59 hereby fixed at the rate of speed indicated for vehicles traveling upon the named streets
60 and highways, or parts thereof, described in the amendments below.

62 **SECTION 3. AMENDMENT TO THE CODE.**

64 The Seabrook City Code, Chapter 90 “Traffic and Vehicles”, Article II. “Speed

72 limits hereafter indicated for vehicles are hereby determined and declared to be
73 reasonable and safe; and such speed limits are hereby fixed at the rate of speed
74 indicated for vehicles traveling upon the named streets and highways, or parts
75 thereof, described as follows:

77 (1) Maximum speed limit established. The maximum speed limit on any road,
78 street, avenue, boulevard or highway within the city limits shall be **30**
79 miles per hour, unless specifically excepted by this section.

81 (2) Exceptions. Notwithstanding the provisions of subsection (a) of this

**ORDINANCE UPDATING HOTEL OCCUPANCY TAX
DELINQUENT TAX INTEREST RATE**

AN ORDINANCE AMENDING CHAPTER 85 OF THE CODE OF ORDINANCES OF THE CITY OF SEABROOK, ENTITLED "TAXATION AND FINANCE," ARTICLE II, ENTITLED "HOTEL OCCUPANCY TAX," SECTION 85-32 "FAILURE TO PAY; REMEDIES", BY AMENDING SUCH SECTION TO CLARIFY THE INTEREST RATE ON DELINQUENT TAXES, PROVIDING AN INTEREST RATE OF 15%; PROVIDING A PENALTY IN AN AMOUNT NOT TO EXCEED \$500 FOR VIOLATION OF ANY PROVISION HEREOF, TOGETHER WITH RELATED PENALTIES AND REMEDIES AS SPECIFIED HEREIN, BY INCLUSION INTO THE CODE OF ORDINANCES; PROVIDING FOR NOTICE, REPEALING ALL ORDINANCES OR PARTS OF ORDINANCES INCONSISTENT OR IN CONFLICT HEREWITH; AND PROVIDING FOR SEVERABILITY.

WHEREAS, the City Council of the City of Seabrook is continually reviewing its programs and the provisions of the Code of Ordinances (Code) to more effectively fund the promotion of tourism, maintenance of City existing programs that promote tourism, and new programs for the attraction of out of town visitors; and

WHEREAS, the City Council of the City of Seabrook has investigated, reviewed and considered the need to clarify the specific interest rate on delinquent taxes as 15%, as provided in Texas Tax Code 351.0042 in addition to the statutory penalty provided in 351.004 and law; and

WHEREAS, Section 2.11(b) of the Seabrook City Charter provides that ordinances relating to taxes do not require two readings, as referenced therein;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF SEABROOK, TEXAS:

Section 1. That the City Council of the City of Seabrook adopts the preceding preamble paragraphs as if repeated verbatim herein and find them as matters of fact.

Section 2. That Chapter 85, "Taxation and Finance", Article II, "Hotel Occupancy Tax," be amended by revising Section 85-32 to clarify the specific interest rate of 15% on delinquent taxes on the hotel occupancy tax as follows:

“Sec. 85-28. - Levy of tax; rate.

There is hereby levied a tax upon the cost of occupancy of any room or space furnished by any hotel where such costs of occupancy is at the rate of \$2.00 or more per day. Such tax shall be equal to 7 percent of the consideration paid by the occupant of such rooms to such hotel. The price of a room in a hotel does not include the cost of food served by the hotel and the cost of personal services performed by the hotel for the person except for those services related to cleaning and readying the room for use or possession.

Sec. 85-29. - Exceptions.

- (a) No tax shall be imposed under this article upon the consideration paid by the occupant of such room who is a permanent resident as provided in § 156.001, Texas Tax Code.
- (b) No tax shall be imposed on a governmental entity of the United States or an officer or employee of a governmental entity of the United States when traveling on or otherwise engaged in the course of official duties for the governmental entity; however, the State of Texas or a Texas agency, institution, board, or commission must pay the tax. There is no exemption for city or county officers and employees even if traveling on official business.
- (c) A state officer or employee of a state governmental entity for whom a special provision or exception to the general rate of reimbursement under the General Appropriations Act applies and who is provided with photo identification verifying the identity and exempt status of the person is not required to pay the tax. All individuals claiming this exemption are required to fill out a hotel occupancy exemption certificate.
- (d) The right to use or possess a room or space in a hotel is exempt from taxation under this chapter if the person required to collect the tax receives, in good faith from a guest, a properly completed exemption certificate stating that the guest is qualified for an exemption under V.T.C.A., Tax Code §§ 156.102 or 156.103. An exemption certificate must be supported by the documentation required under rules adopted by the comptroller.

Sec. 85-30. - Use of tax collected.

- (a) Any revenues from the tax may only be used for purposes specified in accordance with V.T.C.A., Tax Code § 351.101, including:

- (1) The acquisition of sites for any construction, improvement, enlarging, equipping, repairing, operation, and maintenance of convention center facilities or visitor information centers, or both;
 - (2) The furnishing of facilities, personnel and materials for the registration of convention delegates or registrants;
 - (3) Advertising and conducting solicitations and promotional programs to attract tourists and convention delegates or registrants to the municipality or its vicinity;
 - (4) The encouragement, promotion, improvement, and application of the arts, including instrumental and vocal music, dance, drama, folk art, creative writing, architecture, design and allied fields, painting, sculpture, photography, graphic and craft arts, motion pictures, radio, television, tape and sound recording, and other arts related to the presentation, performance, execution, and exhibition of these major art forms; and
 - (5) Historical restoration and preservation projects or activities or advertising and conducting solicitations and promotional programs to encourage tourists and convention delegates to visit preserved historic sites or museums:
 - a. At or in the immediate vicinity of convention center facilities or visitor information centers; or
 - b. Located elsewhere in the municipality or its vicinity that would be frequented by tourists and convention delegates.
 - (6) Subject to V.T.C.A., Tax Code § 351.1076, the promotion of tourism by the enhancement and upgrading of existing sports facilities or fields, including facilities or fields for baseball, softball, soccer, and flag football, if the city owns the facilities or fields and the sports facilities and fields have been used, in the preceding calendar year, a combined total of more than ten times for district, state, regional, or national sports tournaments;
 - (7) Signage directing the public to sights and attractions that are visited frequently by hotel guests in the municipality.
- (b) The City Council may, by contract, delegate to a person, including another governmental entity or a private organization, the management or supervision of programs and activities funded with revenue from the tax authorized by this article. The City Council in writing shall approve in advance the annual budget of the person to which it delegates those functions and shall require the person to make periodic reports to the City Council at least quarterly listing the expenditures made by the person with revenue from the tax authorized by this article. The person must maintain revenue provided from the tax authorized by this article in a separate account established for that purpose and may not commingle that revenue with any other money. The City may not delegate to any person the management or supervision of its convention and visitors programs and activities funded with revenue from the tax authorized by this article other than by contract as provided by this subsection. The

approval by the City Council of the annual budget of the person to whom the City Council delegates those functions creates a fiduciary duty in the person with respect to the revenue provided by the tax authorized by this article.

Any person owning, operating, managing or controlling any hotel shall collect the tax imposed by this article for the city and make payment as provided in Section 85-34.

Sec. 85-32. - Failure to pay; remedies.

(a) The city attorney or other attorney acting for the city may bring suit against a person who is required to collect the tax imposed by this article and pay the collections over to the city and who has failed to file a tax report or pay the tax when due, to collect the tax not paid or to enjoin the person from operating a hotel in the city until the tax is paid or the report filed, as applicable, as provided by the court's order. In addition to the amount of any tax owed under this article, the person is liable to the city for the city's reasonable attorney's fees, the costs of an audit and a penalty equal to 15 percent of the total amount of the tax owed and all other remedies provided by V.T.C.A., Tax Code § 351.004.

(b) **A person who fails to pay a tax due under this chapter is liable to the City for interest on the unpaid amount at the rate of 15%, and interest under this section accrues from the first day after the date due until the tax is paid.**

(c**[b]**) V.T.C.A., Civil Practice and Remedies Code § 16.061, applies to the collection of a tax under this article. A limitation period provided by Title 2 of the Tax Code (V.T.C.A., Tax Code § 101.001 et seq.) relating to the time allowed to assess taxes and bring a suit to collect taxes does not apply to a tax imposed under this article or to a suit brought under this section.

(d**[e]**) The remedies provided for in this section are in addition to other available remedies.

Every person who is required by the provisions of this article to collect the tax imposed in this article shall have a record of the following information:

- (1) The names and addresses of all occupants of the establishment;
- (2) The period of time for which each room is rented; and
- (3) The consideration paid for such rental.

Sec. 85-34. - Quarterly reports to city director of finance.

- (a) On the last day of the month following each quarterly period, every person required in this article to collect the tax imposed in this article, shall file a report with the city director of finance showing the consideration paid for all room occupancies in the preceding quarter, the amount of the tax collected on such occupancies, and any other information the city director of finance may reasonably require. Such person shall pay the tax due on such occupancies at the time of filing such report. There shall also be furnished to the director of finance at the time of payment of such tax, a copy of the quarterly tax report filed with the state controller in connection with the state hotel occupancy tax.
- (b) The failure of any person owning, operating, managing or controlling such hotel to collect sufficient monies from the occupants to satisfy the tax shall not excuse his or her obligation to pay the tax to the city.

Sec. 85-35. - Rules and regulations; access to books and records.

The city director of finance shall have the authority to require an operator to provide documentation regarding information contained in a tax report filed pursuant to this article in order to verify the information provided in such tax report and to verify the amount of municipal hotel occupancy taxes due. Upon such request of the director of finance, an operator shall do one of the following:

- (1) Produce all records requested and deliver such records to the director of finance in a form acceptable to him/her; or
- (2) Make all records requested available for inspection during the hours of 8:00 a.m. to 5:00 p.m., Monday through Friday.

Sec. 85-36. - Violation of article a misdemeanor.

If any person required by the provisions of this article to collect the tax imposed in this article, make reports as required in this article, and pay to the city director of finance the tax imposed in this article, shall fail to collect such tax, shall fail to file such report, or shall fail to pay such tax, or if such person shall file a false report, such person shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor.

Sec. 85-37. - Appeal of tax.

- (a) Upon a determination by the city director of finance that an operator has not paid the full amount of the municipal hotel occupancy tax due, s/he shall notify such operator in writing of such deficiency and of the operator's right to appeal the determination. Such notice shall be sent by first class mail.
- (b) Upon receipt of written notice of a determination by the city director of finance that a balance is due for the municipal hotel occupancy tax, the operator may either pay the amount due or appeal in writing to the city manager.
- (c) An appeal must be filed within 14 days after receipt of the notice of determination from the city director or finance.
- (d) The city manager/designee shall grant or deny the appeal and shall notify the operator of his/her decision in a written notice sent by first class mail within 14 days of receiving the request.

Each day of violation shall constitute a separate offense.
