**ADOPTION OF THE CITY OF SEABROOK
COMPREHENSIVE MASTER PLAN 2035**

AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY OF SEABROOK, TEXAS, ADOPTING THE “SEABROOK COMPREHENSIVE MASTER PLAN 2035” PURSUANT TO TEXAS LOCAL GOVERNMENT CODE CHAPTER 213 AND SECTION 11.23 OF THE SEABROOK CITY CHARTER AS PROVIDED HEREIN; REPEALING ALL ORDINANCES AND RESOLUTIONS INCONSISTENT OR IN CONFLICT HERewith; AND PROVIDING FOR SEVERABILITY.

WHEREAS, Chapter 213 of the Texas Local Government Code provides that municipalities may adopt a comprehensive plan for long range development for the City, and that such a comprehensive plan may include, but is not limited to provisions of land use, transportation, public facilities, and to coordinate and guide the establishment of development regulations; and

WHEREAS, pursuant to Section 11.23 of the Charter of the City of Seabrook, the Seabrook City Council appointed a Comprehensive Master Plan Review Commission (“Commission”), comprised of seven (7) citizens, for the purpose of developing such a plan pursuant to Chapter 213 of the Texas Local Government Code; and

WHEREAS, the Commission conducted an extensive review, conducted public hearings, and received public and staff comments; and thereafter made its final recommendations to the City Council for adoption of the “Seabrook Comprehensive Master Plan 2035” (“Master Plan 2035”), attached hereto as Exhibit “A”; and

WHEREAS, after the subject public hearings, studies, and reviews, the City Council has considered and has accepted the recommended changes of the Commission incorporated into the “Seabrook Comprehensive Master Plan 2035,” to be adopted in accordance with the limitations, restrictions and requirements of Chapter 213 of the Texas Local Government Code for use as a future planning device of an advisory nature only, with the specific intent that the Master Plan 2035 is not to conflict with zoning regulations, which will prevail in case of conflict; and

WHEREAS, all public notices have been posted, published and all required hearings on this matter have been held in accordance with law;

NOW THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF SEABROOK, STATE OF TEXAS:

SECTION 1. FINDINGS OF FACT.

That the facts and matters set forth in the preamble of this Ordinance are hereby found to be true and correct.

SECTION 2. ADOPTION OF COMPREHENSIVE MASTER PLAN 2035.

The “Seabrook Comprehensive Master Plan 2035” is hereby adopted pursuant to the limitations, restrictions and requirements of Section 213 of the Texas Local Government Code, as contained herein, Section 11.23 of the Charter of the City of Seabrook, and any map of the Master Plan 2035 illustrating future land use shall contain the following clearly visible statement “A comprehensive plan shall not constitute a zoning regulation or establish zoning district boundaries.”

SECTION 3. REPEAL OF CONFLICTING ORDINANCES AND RESOLUTIONS.

All Ordinances or Resolutions or parts of Ordinances or Resolutions in conflict or inconsistent with this Ordinance are hereby expressly repealed.

SECTION 4. SEVERABILITY.

In the event any clause phrase, provision, sentence, or part of this Ordinance or the application of the same to any person or circumstances shall for any reason be adjudged invalid or held unconstitutional by a court of competent jurisdiction, it shall not affect, impair, or invalidate this Ordinance as a whole or any part or provision hereof other than the part declared to be invalid or unconstitutional; and the City Council of the City of Seabrook, Texas, declares that it would have passed each and every part of the same notwithstanding the omission of any such part thus declared to be invalid or unconstitutional, whether there be one or more parts

Seabrook Planning and Zoning Commission Rules of Procedure

Membership/Structure. These Rules and Procedures are enacted under the authority of the Seabrook City Charter, Article VI. “Planning and Zoning”, for the purpose of establishing uniform and fair policies for the conduct of business entrusted to the Planning and Zoning Commission (the “Commission”) pursuant to the Charter. The Rules of Procedure contained herein, are enacted pursuant to Charter Section 6.03 “Rules of Procedure”.

The Council shall appoint a Planning and Zoning Commission which shall consist of seven (7) members. Each member shall be a qualified voter at the time of appointment and shall be a resident within the corporate limits of the City of Seabrook and shall have been a resident for a period of twelve (12) months prior to appointment. He or she shall hold no other position elective, appointive, or salaried in the City government, and shall serve without pay. The Mayor, the City Manager, the City Engineer and other ex officio members as the Council may provide by resolution, shall serve as nonvoting members of the Commission. All actions of this Commission shall be in accordance with the Texas Local Government Code §§ 211.001 et. seq., 212.001 et seq., and as otherwise required by law, as now or hereafter amended. The Commission is subject to the Texas Open Meeting Law, Chapter 551, Texas Government Code.

Officers, Duties and Elections. The Officers of the Planning and Zoning Commission shall consist of a Chair and Vice-Chair. The Officers of the Board shall be elected by majority vote of Commission at the regular scheduled meeting in January. Terms of office shall be three (3) years. Vacancies occurring in the Commission, for whatever reason, shall be filled by appointment by the Council, for the remainder of the unexpired term. (Charter Section 6.02).

Conflicts of Interest. No Commissioner shall vote or participate as a Commissioner in any proceeding before the Commission that involves any matter regarding a business entity or real property in which that Commissioner has a substantial interest as provided by Local Government Code Sections 171.001 et. seq., and 212.017 (attached). If a substantial interest exists, the affected Commissioner shall disclose the nature and extent to the Commission by affidavit and remove him or herself from any participation in the discussion, deliberations, or action on the matter. Each Commissioner shall comply with all related disclosure requirements contained in the Seabrook Code of Ordinances/Charter and related law.

Applicant Discussions. Individual Commissioners shall not meet with or discuss with any Applicant issues subject to the regulation or authority of the Planning and Zoning Commission except within the confines of properly posted and noticed meetings.

Chair’s Duties. The Chair shall preside over each meeting of the Commission. To this affect the Chair:

- Shall conduct meetings in an orderly, fair, and open manner.
- Shall oversee preparation of the Agenda for each meeting of the Commission.

Pursuant to authorizations given by the Commission, the Chair shall:

- Sign Plats
- Submit findings and recommendations of the Commission to be forwarded to the City Council
- Prepare certifications of reasons for approval or denial of Plats requested by interested persons, in accordance with state law
- Correspond with the City Manager, Staff Liaison, City Council, or other boards or commissions as directed by the City Council
- At his or her discretion, request investigation by City staff, with authorization of the City Manager, regarding comments or questions brought by or to the attention of the Commission

Vice Chair's Duties. The Vice Chair shall preside in the absence of the Chair. In the event of the absence or disability of both the Chair and Vice Chair, the Commissioners shall elect an Acting Chair to preside during such absence. The Vice Chair or Acting Chair shall perform all of the acts required of the Chair until his or her return or replacement.

Meetings. Regular Commission meetings will occur once per month on the third Thursday at 7pm in Council Chambers (or at such other time or location as designated by the Agenda) or dates as called by the chairman or Commission. If no items have been presented for an agenda the Chairman may reschedule the Regular Meeting. If it should be necessary because of the workload that any Regular Meeting be continued to the following day, such a meeting will reconvene on the day following, and this second meeting shall be considered as part of the same session. In case of inclement weather or natural disaster any meeting may be cancelled and rescheduled by the Chairman of the Commission or the order of the Mayor/City Council. The Planning and Zoning Commission may hold joint meetings with the City Council or other boards, commissions or task forces in addition to their own meetings. Public notice of all joint meetings shall be given as required by the Texas Open Meetings Act, Section 551.001, *et seq.* of the Government Code.

Agenda. Items for consideration and/or action by the Commission may be placed on a meeting Agenda as follows:

- By the Chair or the Commission;
- At the direction of the City Council or the request of the City Manager, or the Staff Liaison;
- By written request from any other board or commission of the City, as approved by City Council and delivered to the Chair or the Staff Liaison; or
- As required by state law or the Code of Ordinances.

No item may be submitted for inclusion on a meeting Agenda after noon of the seventh day preceding the date of such meeting absent consent of the Chair or City Manager.

Applications for zoning changes, Conditional Use Permits and Plats which require the sending of written notice or publication in a newspaper under the provisions of state law, the Code of Ordinances of the City, or the Charter of the City will be scheduled in accordance with those requirements.

Applications. Requests for Zoning Permits, Subdivision Plat Approval, Conditional Use Permits, and other permits delegated by state law or the City Council of the City of Seabrook (the “City”) shall be filed with the Building Department on application forms, and accompanied by the requisite fee(s), in such form as required by the Building Official. No application, whether complete or not, will be accepted without full payment of the Application Fee enacted by the City Council in the Fee Ordinance of the City.

Applications for Permits or Approvals under the jurisdiction of the Commission shall be developed by the City staff and approved by the City Attorney. Applications shall be completed in full by those seeking an action by the Commission and any incomplete application shall be grounds for disapproval by the Commission. Applications for preliminary or final plats which are incomplete and/or fail to comply with all City requirements, as determined by staff are not considered filed for purposes of approval by the Commission.

Conduct of Meetings. The Chair or, in his/her absence, by the Vice Chair/Acting Chair shall be the presiding officer at all meetings of the Commission and shall have a vote in all of its proceedings. Commissioners shall speak only on being recognized and given the floor by the Chair, whose recognition shall not be unreasonably withheld. A Commissioner may yield time, if time limits are imposed, during his speaking to another Commissioner upon request by that Commissioner or the Chair. Upon expiration of the time yielded the speaker shall regain the floor and shall be so recognized by the Chair.

Communications from the Public. In order to maintain decorum, no person shall be permitted to enter the public portions of City Hall facilities or speak for or against any item on any agenda unless that person is appropriately attired.

All cell phones and pagers are to be turned off in the council chambers or in any other room or building in which an official Commission meeting is held and is in session.

Any person having business before the Commission may speak at the beginning of the meeting, or as otherwise directed by the Commission, on any item not posted for a hearing on the agenda under the agenda item “Public Comments and Announcements.” Any person desiring to do so will be afforded the opportunity to address the Commission at that time. Citizens who wish to bring up a matter not on the agenda may do so, but comments shall be limited to city business or city-related business and shall not include any personal attacks. Persons desiring to address the Commission on any non-listed item shall sign his or her name and address on the form provided at the meeting. Speakers will be limited to four minutes. No media presentations are permitted for this agenda item.

Except for comments under "Public Comments and Announcements", citizens may not address the Commission at Commission meetings unless the agenda provides for a public hearing. In order to avoid any compliance issues with the Texas Open Meeting Law, questions presented to the Commission may be referred to staff, but shall not otherwise be discussed or debated by the Commission except in relation to a noticed agenda item at the time of discussion of that item.

Jeering, booing, cheering, clapping or otherwise vocally or audibly expressing agreement or disagreement with the Commission or a speaker in a Commission meeting shall not be tolerated.

Public Hearings. Items posted for hearing on the agenda will be heard in the order of their listing unless the presiding Chair modifies the order of the agenda without objection by the Commission. Any citizen wishing to speak at a Commission meeting shall be required to sign the roster as provided or otherwise identify himself/herself for purposes of the record after being recognized by the Chair.

Public Hearings shall be conducted in accordance with state law provisions and any person wishing to address the Commission shall sign up giving his or her name and address on the form provided at the meeting. To maintain decorum, the Chairman, at any meeting will ask the citizens present if they wish to speak for or against any item on the agenda. If so, they will be given an opportunity to do so at the proper time, when recognized by the Chair. Public Hearings shall be generally conducted in the following order subject to a suspension of the rules as specified by a two thirds vote of the Commissioners present:

- Chair announces the agenda item;
- Staff presents its report on the request including any recommendations;
- Applicant presents request (10 minute time limit). Video/electronic media presentations are permitted (subject to the availability of the City's electronic equipment) and are subject to the time limits above;
- Those in Support of the request and who have signed up present their comments and information (four minute time limit each);
- Those in Opposition to the request and who have signed up present their comments and information (four minute time limit each);
- Applicant presents rebuttal information (four minute time limit);
- Hearing is closed by the Chair.

The Commission may then discuss the request, ask questions or hear from any member of the audience or staff to clarify any part of the request without the necessity of a motion. No person who has signed up to speak may reserve his or her time or yield any time to another person.

Upon completion of all Public Hearings the Commission may propose motions to Approve, Deny, Table, Postpone/Continue to a future meeting, or Refer any matter for further study so long as such referral is in compliance with state law, the Code of Ordinances of the City and the City Charter.

Action Item Checklist. Any Planning & Zoning Commission member may put an item on the Action Item Checklist, but it takes a majority vote to move an item from the Checklist to the Agenda. The items will be listed by the deadline date assigned (anticipated completion date) and sponsored by a member of the Planning & Zoning Commission.

Parliamentary procedure. In regular and special meetings, the rules contained in the current edition of “Robert's Rules of Order, Newly Revised” will be followed unless otherwise noted in this section or except as otherwise provided by state law, the municipal code or by City Council adopted policy. However, breach of Robert’s Rules of Order, in and of itself, shall not render any action of the Commission invalid. The following commonly used procedures shall be followed:

Motion to Limit Debate or Close Debate (Calling the Question or Cloture). Commissioners shall have unlimited time for any discussion unless a motion is made to Limit Debate or Close Debate (Call the Question), the motion is seconded and it is approved by 2/3rds vote of those Commissioners present.

The Chair shall recognize any motion to Limit Debate immediately upon hearing a Second. The motion to Limit Debate is amendable and must receive 2/3rds vote of those Commissioners present.

The Chair shall recognize any motion to Close Debate immediately and no further comments from any Commissioner shall be made until the motion to Close Debate has been disposed of. Passage of the motion to Close Debate shall terminate debate on the motion, amendment or amend motion, and the matter shall move on immediately. A failure of 2/3rds majority vote to Close Debate shall entitle the speaker to continue without interruption for an unlimited time and no subsequent motion to Close Debate may be introduced until one hour of time has elapsed since the previous motion to Close Debate was voted upon.

Any Commissioner may call for the question on any issue, and upon seconding by another Commissioner, the issue shall immediately be put to vote. This shall be done by the member calling for the previous question.

The Commission may agree to limit debate on any business before it. That agreement may be formalized by a majority of the Commission on roll call vote.

Any member may request a roll call vote at any time.

The presiding officer shall not entertain any dilatory motions.

Decorum and Debate. When a measure is presented for consideration to the Commission, the presiding officer shall recognize the appropriate individual to present the case. When two or more members wish to speak, the presiding officer shall name the member who is to speak first. No member of the Commission shall interrupt another while speaking except to make a point of order or to make a point of personal privilege.

No Commissioner shall be permitted to indulge in personalities, use language personally offensive, arraign motives of members, charge deliberate misrepresentation, or use language tending to hold a member of the Commission up to contempt.

If a Commissioner is speaking or otherwise transgressing the rules of the Commission, the presiding officer shall, or any Commissioner may, call him or her to order in which case he or she shall immediately be quiet unless permitted to explain. The Commission shall, if appealed to, decide the case without debate. If the decision is in favor of the member called to order, he or she shall be at liberty to proceed, but not otherwise.

Each member of the Planning and Zoning Commission present at a meeting shall cast one vote on all matters before the Commission, except for matters requiring a recusal or where an abstention is appropriate. The rule, under Robert's Rules of Order, for the Chair to abstain where the vote is already decided by a clear majority and the Chair vote would not act as a tiebreaker is waived.

Approval

Upon an affirmative vote, these Rules and Procedures, and any amendments thereto, shall be forwarded to the City Council for their review and approval. Upon the City Council's approval, the Rules and Procedures, or any amendments thereto, shall become effective.



Economic and Market Commentary: Fed stays close to the vest; money funds show their cards

May 1, 2016

As the world combed through another murky Federal Reserve policy statement last month, cash managers had an additional task: making new SEC money fund rules as clear as possible.

The latest Federal Open Market Committee (FOMC) decision on April 27 not to raise the federal funds rate is best summarized as an “OK” statement. It was not overly negative or positive, which means it was impossible to read with any certainty. Nothing new there. Chair Janet Yellen and company downplayed global volatility but showed more concern about domestic activity. With her members starting to take sides on rates, she seemed to tiptoe between them in order to get to the summer for a better view of the economy. It makes sense, as the first quarter of the last couple of years has been out of step with the remainder. The FOMC statement emphasized the improvement of the labor market but reinforced that inflation still refuses to follow suit. Our in-house view still calls for two hikes in 2016—the first in June or July—but the market is already kicking the June meeting to the side.

In the weeks before the vague Fed statement came out, we were immersed in the implementation of some of the SEC’s money fund rule changes from 2014. On April 14, it began to require money market funds to disclose more information, such as the




Portfolio by Maturity (%)




Portfolio by Maturity (%)



amount of liquid assets in their portfolios. Believe it or not, we are happy the SEC did this. It specifically designed these disclosure rules to come out six months ahead of requirements that institutional prime and municipal money funds float their net asset values (NAV) and create fees and gates procedures.

The disclosures will be crucial in getting clients comfortable with the reforms. We feel that the more they understand the changes, the less concerned they will be about them. We want investors to see that the floating NAVs—now reported out to the hundredth of a penny—are essentially steady and that our portfolios have well above 30% in weekly liquid assets. And we want them to realize that they have the ability to track all of this daily by themselves.

There's additional disclosure with regard to month-end portfolios. It used to be that certain portfolio characteristics provided to the SEC were not made public for 60 days. That has now been shortened to a 5-day lag. For clients who want to look at potential volatility in products, this will be very helpful.

Cash managers welcome all of this openness because we hope it will convince institutional clients to stay in prime and municipal funds. Certainly, clients are happy about the additional yield they've been getting lately. The yield of prime over government portfolios was about 20-22 basis points in April, well above the historic average of around 12. That should offer plenty of incentive for clients to take a close look at how they operate, especially as some may need to amend their own investment policies to invest in a floating NAV.



90-Day Treasury Bill is a short-term debt instrument backed by the national government. These are used to collect immediate cash to meet outstanding obligations.

Any private investor can invest in a Treasury bill. The 90-Day Treasury Bill is a weighted average rate of the weekly auctions of 90-Day Treasury Bills.

The uncertainty in how many assets will remain in these products has led us to maintain a higher amount of liquid assets in our institutional prime and municipal portfolios, which slightly shortened our weighted average maturity (WAM). We are also not buying securities past six months at this point for this subset. In the 3- to 12-month space, the London interbank offered rate bumped up slightly over the month.

Economic and Market Commentary: Fed stays close to the vest; money funds show their cards

June 1, 2016

Mind the Federal Reserve. The market is finally doing so with Brexit, remembering that it is the D.C. Metro that leads to what's important, not the London tube. Those obsessed with the possibility Britain will leave the European Union are realizing the Fed may not be. It's led to a remarkable swing in sentiment, with the market moving from as low as a 5% probability that the Fed will raise rates in June to now around about five times that, and more than 50% probability for a move in July. The shift started midmonth with the release of the April 27 Federal Open Market Committee (FOMC) minutes. These revealed more discussion about a hike than did the original, vague statement. A parade of Fed officials followed, seeming to prepare the market for action, even though the next meeting brushes up against the Brexit vote. The last was Chair Janet Yellen's pre-Memorial Day weekend remarks that a hike could be "appropriate in the coming months."

A hike in summer is a position we have taken for some time, primarily because we take the Fed at its word that it looks at the long development of data and not daily or weekly volatility. Domestic economic statistics have been good: not anything wonderful, but not anything terrible. The Fed likes steady, if slight, improvement. Although inflation at the producer level is still low, core Consumer Price Index came in around 2%, personal




Portfolio by Maturity (%)




Portfolio by Maturity (%)



consumption expenditures and retail sales are robust, the labor and housing markets remain strong and even manufacturing has been healing. We don't think Brexit matters to policymakers as much as the improving statistics, and a "leave" vote wouldn't be that big of an influence anyway because it will take years to implement all the changes that would entail.

As for the volatility in early 2016 that many (far fewer now) saw as spawned by the Fed's lifting rates off zero, it wasn't the end of the world. The market lived through it. I think policymakers have good cover at this point for a hike. The data released in the next few weeks ahead of the June 15 FOMC meeting would have to be bad to push it later.

In the meantime, we continue to see good returns for prime portfolios. The spread between prime and government portfolios is about 22 basis points across the industry versus a historic average of about 12-13 basis points. This performance has caused some cash managers to hold off moving investments from prime products to govies and it might keep them from ever transferring a substantial portion of their cash. In addition, the London interbank offered rate is still ticking up, if slowly. Investors in prime portfolios are enjoying the yield spread for now. As to their feelings nearer to the Oct. 14 implementation of the new SEC money fund rules, no one knows for sure. But even as the industry endures many operational changes, much money spent and general stress, it might just be that cash managers keep calm and carry on.



Economic and Market Commentary: Money funds anchored during Brexit

July 1, 2016

Of all the nautical slang that has stuck around from the days when Britain ruled the high seas, "Keeping an even keel" most describes how money markets reacted to the shock of Brexit. The Leave vote caused tremendous volatility in the equity markets—plenty of investors abandoning ship—but didn't produce unusual flows or activity for cash managers. Our dollar and sterling products have behaved normally. It is, of course, often the case that volatility drives investors and brokers to take money out of equities and into money funds, but that didn't happen in any meaningful way after the unexpected outcome of the referendum. In fact, one way of judging the severity of a financial upheaval is the volume of flows into money funds. The greater the amount, the more serious the panic. So it was no surprise to us that equities rallied only a few days after they plunged in the immediate aftermath of the announcement that the U.K. will leave the European Union.

Actually, much of the activity since that announcement can be attributed to the run-up to quarter-end, with its typical reduced supply and higher rates. To be sure, overnight rates were elevated on Friday in part because banks were willing to make repo transactions early in the process due to Brexit. Everyone wanted to make sure they were funded rather than shopping around for a few more basis points. For banks, the winning path for liquidity has traditionally been not to hesitate in obtaining repo capital when there is turmoil and uncertainty, and that was the track most banks took.




Portfolio by Maturity (%)




Portfolio by Maturity (%)



But liquidity was never an issue—even participation in the reverse repo facility was not out of the norm. After the shock of the referendum began to dissipate, typical quarter-end pressures clearly became the dominating factor for rates. The Independence Day holiday weekend is a complication, but operations will likely return to business-as-usual July 5. Also, it is important to keep in mind that the U.K.'s extrication from the EU will be a drawn-out process, probably over two years. Nothing is going to happen quickly.

There are several long-term implications of Brexit. Money market funds registered in the U.K. will have to review the situation, but the vast majority are not domiciled there. As is the case with most firms, we will closely monitor and frequently assess the credit of U.K. banks, which we use and will continue to use. If it looks like the world is renegotiating in a way that's problematic for them, we will take that into account as we update our credit views.

Then there's the Federal Reserve. Cash managers would love this to be a medium-term and not a long-term issue. The outlook before the British vote was for a September move, and the London interbank offered rate (Libor) reflected that. But the shock of the Leave vote sunk that chance and pushed Libor down. We have not changed our Weighted Average Maturity (WAM) target ranges and have found value in some longer-dated fixed pieces. However, we think a rate hike is not off the table for 2016, just that the bar has been raised considerably. If the U.S. labor market returns to its recent strength and other economic data impresses, the Fed could well navigate through the headwinds.

103 Gayle Cook, City Manager, stated that this is a clean-up ordinance. Staff began an
104 inventory of signs and it was a great time to look at where signs for no parking zones were
105 placed. We have a series of resolutions on the books for no parking zones, but no signs posted;
106 therefore, the Police Department had no authority to enforce the no parking zones. The approval
107 of Ordinance 2016-14 will make the no parking zones in the previously approved resolutions
108 enforceable. In addition, this ordinance makes the entire block on Waterfront Drive be made a
109 no parking zone.

110

111 Sean Wright, Police Chief, explained that on weekends people are starting to parallel
112 park along Waterfront with a lot of pedestrian visitors, and a no parking zone would make the
113 area safer. Most facilities in the area have adequate parking per the Development Code. The
114 flow of traffic and pedestrian safety are at issue with people parking in spaces that are not
115 designated parking spaces. We don't want to stop people from shopping, and we can look at
116 closing only one side of the street, but it's a high occupancy street that is not designed for
117 parking.

118

119 Ms. Cook stated that there are other new or slightly modified no parking zones on the
120 following: Bahama, Bath, Cook, Ellis, Lakeside, Hardesty, Main, and Old State Highway 146.
121 There is a table within this ordinance that outlines all the no parking zones.

202 in the last 6-8 months, brought up employee salaries to be competitive. They are looking
203 for property to build on, as the current building lease will go away in the near future.

206 up of 14-15 committees and all are in support of the coastal spine. San Jacinto Junior
207 College has a maritime facility and is working on another site to bring tourism to the

It is a recommended schedule of improvements to city capital assets. A capital asset has a gross purchase price of \$50,000 or more and has a useful life of 5 years or more. Mr. Matlock continued with his presentation giving an overview of funding options and detailing the proposed future projects, along with the year proposed for funding, which are as follows:

- SH 146 Corridor hardscape, landscape and branding project (2018)
- Police Station(2022+)
- CVE/DOT Substation under the Red Bluff overpass (2018+)
- Trail: SH 146 pedestrian crossing (2018+)
- Trail: East Meyer trail (2017+)

- Trail: Trailhead at Old SH 146 and Red Bluff (2017+)
- Trail: Centerpoint trail system along SH 146 Corridor (2018+)
- Back Bay Green Core (ongoing)
- Boardwalk in Slough/Old Seabrook Area (2019+)
- Kayak launches (2018+)
- Boardwalk/coastal footpath along Clear Lake (2022+)
- Park irrigation system along trails (2017+)

Mr. Matlock stated that the items are placed on the list in order to be “shovel ready” when grants become available. The projects were grouped according to description and fall under the following categories:

- Water Projects
- Wastewater Projects
- Drainage Projects
- Street Projects
- Facility Projects

Mr. Matlock continued by giving an overview of each project, its cost and the year of fiscal impact. Total cost of all the improvement projects is estimated at \$121,300,727.

Ms. Cook stated that, as much as possible, she has identified the funding sources available for the various projects, as well as the highest needs and the costs involved. She added that more research with financial advisors will be required.

Mayor Royal suggested that, in order for staff to consult with advisors and do further research on funding, this item be revisited at a future meeting to act upon at that time.

AMENDING NUNC PRO TUNC THE NOISE REGULATIONS ORDINANCE

AN ORDINANCE AMENDING ORDINANCE 2012-16 NUNC PRO TUNC, TO CORRECT SCRIVNER’S ERROR BY AMENDING CHAPTER 55 OF THE CODE OF ORDINANCES OF THE CITY OF SEABROOK, ENTITLED “NUISANCES AND MISCELLANEOUS PROVISIONS,” ARTICLE II, ENTITLED “NOISE,” BY REVISING REFERENCES IN SECTION 55-26, “ENFORCEMENT,” PROVIDING A PENALTY IN AN AMOUNT NOT TO EXCEED \$2000 FOR VIOLATION OF ANY PROVISION HEREOF BY INCLUSION INTO THE CODE; REPEALING ALL ORDINANCES OR PARTS OF ORDINANCES INCONSISTENT OR IN CONFLICT HERewith; PROVIDING FOR SEVERABILITY; AND PROVIDING FOR AN EFFECTIVE DATE.

WHEREAS, the City Council of the City of Seabrook is continually reviewing the provisions of the Code of Ordinances; and

WHEREAS, heretofore previously, on or about September 4, 2012, the City Council of the City of Seabrook did enact Ordinance No. 2012-16 for the purpose of amending Chapter 55 “Nuisances and Miscellaneous Provisions”, Article II “Noise” of the Code of Ordinances; and

WHEREAS, Ordinance No. 2012-16 inadvertently contained erroneous references in Section 55-26 (c), referring incorrectly to Section(s) 50, where the proper reference should have been Section 55; and

WHEREAS, approval of the same *nunc pro tunc* (then as now) is appropriate to clarify and correct the subject errors and provide for proper references as approved by City Council on September 4, 2012;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF SEABROOK, TEXAS:

SECTION 1. FINDINGS.

The City Council of the City of Seabrook adopts the preceding preamble paragraphs as if repeated verbatim herein and find them as matters of fact.

SECTION 2. AMENDMENT TO THE SEABROOK CITY CODE

Chapter 55 of the Code of Ordinances of the City Of Seabrook entitled, “Nuisances and Miscellaneous Provisions,” Article II, entitled “Noise,” is hereby amended by revising text in current Section 55-26, “Enforcement” as follows:

46 **“Sec. 55-26. Enforcement.**

47

48 (a) The chief of police will have primary responsibility for the enforcement of the noise
49 regulations contained herein. Nothing in this chapter shall prevent the chief of police from
50 having the authority to obtain voluntary compliance by way of warning, notice or education.

51

52 (b) If a person's conduct would otherwise violate this chapter and consists of speech or
53 communication delivered to others who have gathered to hear or observe speech or
54 communication; or to others who have gathered to picket or otherwise express in a non-
55 violent manner a position on social, economic, political or religious questions; the person
56 who is in violation of this chapter shall be ordered to, and have the opportunity to, move,
57 disperse, or otherwise remedy the violation, prior to arrest or a citation being issued. The
58 affirmative defenses for speech or expression enumerated in V.T.C.A., Penal Code § 42.04
59 (prior order to move, disperse or remedy) shall also be available in any prosecutions for
60 violations of this article.

61

62 (c) Violation of any provision of this chapter shall be cause for a citation to be issued by
63 the chief of police. In the event the noise violating this chapter is not stopped following
64 issuance of a citation, the chief of police may issue an administrative stop order to any person
65 having possession or control over noise generating property to immediately halt the making
66 of any sound which exceeds the decibel levels in section [~~50-23~~] **55-23** or prohibitions
67 proscribed in section [~~50-24~~] **55-24**.

68

69 (d) In the event a noise violation continues after the delivery of an administrative stop
70 order, the chief of police may apply to any magistrate for an administrative search warrant
71 for the purpose of entering private property to investigate and identify noise nuisance
72 producing devices which are violating this chapter and their owners, and to temporarily seize
73 the devices in the event the owner of the offending noise producing device has been
74 convicted of a violation of this chapter in the previous year. Any noise producing devices
75 seized under this section shall be returned to any person requesting their return and
76 presenting proof of ownership following 24 hours after the seizure of the devices. Any
77 disputed ownership of the seized property shall be resolved at a hearing before a magistrate
78 of the city. Nothing herein shall prevent the city from exercising any other rights or remedies
79 available under this chapter or by other laws.”

80

81 **SECTION 3. INCORPORATION INTO THE CODE; PENALTY CLAUSE.**

82

83 This Ordinance is hereby incorporated and made a part of the Seabrook City Code.
84 Violation of this Ordinance is subject to the penalty section of said Code of Ordinance,
85 Section 1-15 “General penalty; continuing violations” which provides that any person who
86 shall violate any provision of this Ordinance shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor and,

87 upon conviction, shall be fined in an amount not to exceed \$2,000.00. Each day of violation
88 shall constitute a separate offense.

89

90 **SECTION 4. REPEAL OF CONFLICTING ORDINANCES.**

91

92 All ordinances or parts of ordinances in conflict or inconsistent with this Ordinance
93 are hereby expressly repealed.

94

95 **SECTION 5. SEVERABILITY.**

96

97 In the event any clause phrase, provision, sentence, or part of this Ordinance or the
98 application of the same to any person or circumstances shall for any reason be adjudged
99 invalid or held unconstitutional by a court of competent jurisdiction, it shall not affect,
100 impair, or invalidate this Ordinance as a whole or any part or provision hereof other than the
101 part declared to be invalid or unconstitutional; and the City Council of the City of Seabrook,
102 Texas, declares that it would have passed each and every part of the same notwithstanding
103 the omission of any such part thus declared to be invalid or unconstitutional, whether there be
104 one or more parts.

105

106 **SECTION 6. NOTICE.**

107

108 The City Secretary shall give notice of the enactment of this Ordinance by promptly
109 publishing it or its descriptive caption and penalty after final passage in the official
110 newspaper of the City; the Ordinance to take effect upon publication.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED BY THE COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF SEABROOK, STATE OF TEXAS:

SECTION 1. FINDINGS.

SECTION 2. AMENDMENT TO THE SEABROOK CITY CODE AND TO THE OFFICIAL ZONING MAP.

The Seabrook City Code of Ordinances, Appendix A, “Comprehensive Zoning”, Article 2, “Administration”, Section 2.05, “Official Zoning Map” is hereby amended by rezoning 6.322 acres of land identified as of Tract 31, situated in Abstract 52 of the Ritson Morris Survey, Seabrook, Harris County, Texas, located east of Old Highway 146, and immediately north of Red Bluff Road, (more specifically described in the attached Exhibit “A”), from C-2 Commercial-Medium District to R-2 Residential-Single Family Detached Small Lot District.

The property to be rezoned is shown on the survey, identified as Exhibit A and the metes and bounds description, identified as Exhibit B, both of which said Exhibits which are incorporated herein by reference.

Upon passage of this Ordinance, the official zoning map of the City of Seabrook shall be amended to reflect this change.

Each day of violation shall constitute a separate offense.

All ordinances or parts of ordinances in conflict or inconsistent with this Ordinance are hereby expressly repealed.
